“ I am very sad to learn of Bob's passing, but I do have such fond memories of him as a friend and colleague over a 40-year period. He was the consummate human factors engineering professor and scientist, and in the late 1970's, I was truly fortunate to be one of those many graduate students that he taught. One of his instructional specialties was experimental design and statistical analysis as applied to human subject experimentation, and he instilled these skills in hundreds of students at Virginia Tech, and prior to that at the University of Illinois. I consider him as a pioneer in that he laid a foundation for research on human-computer interaction, and this developed into the now so-important field of human-computer interface design. He served the human factors profession for over three decades, including a stint as President of the Human Factors and Ergonomics Society and in many other roles with its scientific publications and standards committees.
